Ministry Expands to Meet Needs

The House of Hope ministry started about three years ago with the goal of starting an orphanage in Haiti. As we have worked in Haiti we've begun to understand the culture better, and we've

Board of Directors of the House of Hope have been discussing how the ministry should expand. We've been praying for a piece of land where we could build a school that could bless as many children as possible. Our prayers were answered and last month we were able to purchase 1.6 acres in a region of Haiti called Wiliamson. The land is located about a 10 minute drive from the House of

However, the school in Wiliamson has a chance to bless that whole region of Haiti. We estimate that there are between 1,500 and 2,000 students who attend primary schools in the Wiliamson region, but we found no schools that go past the 6th grade. The school that we are building in Wiliamson will accept as many students from all of the students in the region that we can. Pastor Quene will administer the school and will pastor a church at the same location. We plan to have our first 7th grade class in the fall.

In addition, we found that the people who live in the mountainous areas have no access to schools at all. Behind the House of Hope, the terrain becomes mountainous, and the nearest mountain village is about a 3-hour hike from the orphanage. The people in the mountains have asked us to put a school there. We are thankful that God provided us with a godly young man named David who felt called to help us plant a church and a primary school in the mountains. By fall we hope to have started a kindergarten. We continue to be amazed at God's provision and leading as we serve the people of Haiti.— Mike Bellamy

We discovered that there are many schools in Haiti that go from kindergarten through the 6th grade (primary schools). However, schools that go past the 6th grade are rare. Those that exist are usually private schools that charge fees that most Haitians cannot afford.

Recently, while looking through a photo album of the children at the House of Hope, I was amazed at the difference three years has made. Initially the children looked like they were just in a survival mode, but now they are vibrant. I thought of the change in Nickso. Nickso is a 10 year old young man who loves the Lord. Mirlande, the director, affectionately calls him “Pastor Nickso,” and with good reason. Nickso loves to worship; I’ve seen him leading the other children in chorus after chorus numerous times. He also loves to pray. One of the most memorable moments for me in Haiti was when Nickso asked if he could pray for me,

and did.

He wrote this prayer for us when we were in Haiti last summer:

“My Savior – I want to thank you that you protect us. You take care of me anytime there is a lot of difficulty. When I look in John 10:11 you said, ‘I am the good Shepherd, the good Shepherd lays down His life for the sheep.’ I bless your name because you are our Shepherd. I pray for everyone who helps us at the House of Hope. I bless your name in the name of Jesus Christ. Amen.”

My wife, Johanna, and I went with Mike and a team of 12 to Haiti in March. Johanna, who is a school nurse here in Oberlin, Kansas, went as a representative of our elementary school. Oberlin Elementary School has adopted the Good Samaritan School at the House of Hope as a sister school. The children at OES have worked on ways to help the children in Haiti, including collecting items like underwear,

toothbrushes, pencils, paper, books and other fun items. While there, Johanna did checkups on the kids in the orphanage to look for any problems and get a baseline of health information on each child.

My wife has always dreamed of doing some sort of mission work so this was an exciting opportunity. I had never had such a dream so it took some convincing on her part. Eventually I warmed up to the idea and even

As a result we were able to purchase 30 Haitian Creole Bibles. These were nice, Old and New Testament Bibles with maps and references.

It was very rewarding giving these Bibles to the Haitian

people. They were very excited to receive them and very thankful. One person in particular was touched by my heart. I had just entered my hotel room with a handful of Bibles to put in my backpack before we headed out for the day, when I noticed the cleaning lady, Adeline, coming out of the bathroom. As she came near me she noticed the Bibles and pointed at them saying, "Bibla?" I said, "Yes, Bibles," and I handed her one.

She got so excited that she squealed. When she left the room she stood outside the room looking at the Bible and I was able to take a picture of her through the window, looking at her new Bible. It's a fuzzy, bad quality picture, but it's my favorite one from the trip. —Pastor Doug Mason, Oberlin, Kansas

H₂O Project Update

In the December, 2008 newsletter we mentioned that the campus ministry “Christian Campus House” at Northwest Missouri State University worked with Countryside Christian Church of Maryville, Missouri to raise money to provide water for people in Haiti. Together they raised \$2,450. As a ministry, we really stress to the people we work with in Haiti the

importance of sharing with the needy people we come across. With the H₂O funds, we’ve been able to reach out to our neighbors. We spent \$450 to dig a badly-needed hand-dug well in Mure. The well is nearly done. To finish it we plan to put a concrete lip around it to keep rainwater from washing bacteria into the well. We’d also really like to figure out how to put a good-

quality hand pump on the well.

In addition, in the area of the mountains where we’re planting a church/school, we gave the people in the mountains \$550 to dig a well. They’re in desperate need of water since the last hurricane blew over a large tree, blocking the flow of water from a spring that was their only source of water. We’d also like to put a spring box there and put a hand pump on the well.

Finally, we’ve begun to dig a well in Williamson that will be used by the church and school.
